NAZI DRIVES HALTED

More Railway Lines in Vital Area Captured, Moscow Says

MOSCOW, Thursday, Dec. 31.—(P)—Soviet armies pressing relentlessly against the Germans on four major war fronts pushed deeper into the frozen areas south of Stalingrad yesterday and captured at least a dozen district centers, populated places and stations, the Russians announced early today.

The Soviet bureau of information communique, issued during the early morning, said that the district center of Remantnoe had been captured by the Red army. Remantnoe is 40 miles northwest of Elista, the provincial capital of Kalmyck, toward which a Russian force is driving, and is 75 miles south of Kotelnikovsk, major German base which the Russians have overrun.

The Russians announced new successes in their winter campaigns as the right wing of the Soviet offensive upon Rostov moved slowly over German counterattacks, but the left, which smashed Kotelnikovsk, was a smashing southwestward along the railway leading down to the Black Sea and deep into the Kalmyck Steppe territory.

Giving more details of the capture of Kotelnikovsk, the Soviet communique said that two German infantry regiments were "routed" in that Russian victory while at Jashkul, 60 miles east of Elista, units of the enemy motorized division were defeated.

"Continuing their advance the Soviet troops killed 1,500 enemy officers and men, destroyed 15 tanks, 20 guns, 12 mortars and 50 trucks," the communique said.

Nazi Reserves Used
In the middle Don area, the offensive aimed toward Rostov and the lower Ukraine, Soviet troops "repulsed counterattacks of enemy reserves which had reached the area of operation," it was said.

The forward drive on the central front continued, the communique added, with the Germans being pushed from fortified positions and one infantry company being annihilated by the Red army.

The war report said that fighting still was going on in the factory area of battered Stalingrad, with Soviet assault parties capturing 24 enemy blockhouses and dislodging the enemy from several blocks.

Height Captured
Northwest of Stalingrad, a height of great tactical importance was reported captured and it was held against several counterattacks by the "Hitlerite."

The fall of Kotelnikovsk—the main forward base used by the Germans in the siege of Stalingrad—was followed by the swift capture of a number of additional towns and villages, the Soviet command announced in its midday communique. Among the trophies of war were the headquarters of two Nazi infantry divisions.

Two Columns
This Soviet army was thrusting forward roughly in two great columns.

One was advancing down the railroad from reclaimed Kotelnikovsk.

Howard Dotson, 27, employed by the Arizona Constructors' Company, was shot in the face and killed instantly about 10:20 last night at East Fourth street and North Stone avenue.

Dotson was riding in a car driven by Lawrence E. Redman, 246 South Fourth avenue. According to Redman he had driven up to the boulevard stop on East Fourth when a sedan, with three Negroes in it, drove up between his car and the curb. Words, he said, were exchanged between Dotson and the Negroes. Dotson got out of the car, and at that time the driver of the blue Dodge fired at him.

City detectives, police and County Attorney J. Mercer Johnson were questioning Redman and Philip Brandenburg, 1133 East Elm, who was the first to notify police of the shooting, in an attempt to unravel a considerable amount of information on the case.

Coroner C. W. Gardner said that Dotson died almost instantly. A post mortem was ordered immediately. He is survived by a wife and a two-year-old baby, according to Redman.

Redman said that he had been working for the Arizona Constructors' Company for only a short time, having arrived in the city (Continued to Page 5 Column 7)

U. S. Can Send 3,000,000 Men Abroad in '43, Says Chandler

Senator, Who Is Member of Military Affairs Committee, Expects Nation to Have 4,500,000 Overseas By End of Year; Production Record Praised

The United States can put 3,000,000 more fully equipped men overseas on far-flung battlefronts next year if necessary, Sen. A. B. (Happy) Chandler, (Ky.), member of the senate military affairs committee, said here yesterday just before he left for Washington after a tour of western military posts and installations. This, added to the million and a half men he said are already overseas, would give the United States a force of 4,500,000 on the various war fronts of the world by the end of 1943.

"During the first part of the first World War it took us a year and a half to get 2,000,000 men overseas, and we had to borrow equipment for them," Chandler said. "In the last year we got nearly a million and a half men to posts scattered all over the world, and every man was well-trained and well equipped."

Shipping Record
Chandler pointed to the production record of 8,000,000 tons of new merchant shipping achieved during the last year and said, "We'll probably up that to at least 12,000,000 tons and possibly 15,000,000 tons this coming year."

"We're licking the submarine menace, and with our increased production of ships, coupled with shortened supply lines, we should better be able to take care of the material needs of our overseas forces."

"In the last war no submarines were sunk by action of gun crews on merchant vessels. Well, this last year there were some subs sunk by merchant ships. And there will be more."

Not Too Big
The increase in the man-power of our fighting forces to 3,700,000, contemplated for the coming year, is not too great for the needs of the nation, Chandler believes. "It's better to have a bigger army than we need than a smaller army than we need," he said.

"Three million of those men will go into our rapidly expanding air force. It takes a lot of men on the ground to keep the airplane in the air. And we are getting results from our airpower."

"The Japs, 8,000 to 10,000 of them, who invaded Kiska island in the Aleutians, are isolated there now because of our air force. When they moved in we were able to send only a few planes to harass them. Now we can send squadrons of bombers and long range escorting fighter planes, who make the Japs suffer increasingly hard blows, day after day."

Distribution Now
"We've won the battle of production. From now on out it will be merely a matter of distribution. Our railroads have done a much better job than they did in the last war, and with more ships, our

4 POLICE ARE HELD

Some Who Aided Allied Landings Included In Roundup

ALGIERS, Dec. 30.—(P)—Gen. Henri Honore Giraud, new French high commissioner, today announced the arrest of 12 persons to prevent "further assassinations" in the wake of the slaying of his predecessor, Admiral Jean Darlan, who aided Allied occupation of French Africa.

Darlan was killed by an assassin's bullet just six days ago and General Giraud said, "there must be complete order behind the lines. Now order cannot be called complete when a high commissioner such as Darlan can be murdered."

"That is why, being in command and having received the commission, I took certain preventive measures in order to prevent a recurrence of such tragic events as the one a week ago."

Plot Disclosed
(Correspondents for the National Broadcasting Company and the Columbia Broadcasting System reported from Algiers that the assassination plot was directed among others against General Giraud and Robert Murphy, United States minister to French Africa. Milwaukee-born Murphy helped pave the way for occupation of North Africa by American troops.)

Four of the 12 arrested, General Giraud said, were police officers. "They knew Darlan was going to be murdered and did not warn their superiors," General Giraud said.

When word of the arrests spread through Algiers, General Giraud hastily called a press conference and said that those taken into custody were "only put in shelter," adding that it was his aim to "prevent rather than punish."

While General Giraud asserted that "we've not only arrested people who helped us land, but also those who helped Germans," it was reported reliably among them were only two who aided the Allied landings actively.

Interior Cleaning
"What I did yesterday was merely a question of doing some interior cleaning and it would be exciting the passions to give great importance to a matter which is entirely French and therefore the names of the arrested are withheld."

"I would like to believe that the murder (of Darlan) was the work of a lunatic, but such a man must not be led by those with other ideas and perhaps other plans."

"I have but one aim—to win the war with the support of all France and our Allies."

Admiral Darlan was killed by a 22-year-old assassin Christmas Eve. The youth was executed by a firing squad December 26 after claiming, a military tribunal said, that he acted without accomplices. He was of French nationality with an Italian mother. Giraud asserted that the present military situation in Tunisia "is difficult because Germany has accepted the fight in Tunisia and particularly because the battle which started six weeks ago is hardly won."

FLOODS SWEEP EASTERN AREAS

Thousands Homeless As Streams Leave Banks In Many States

Flood waters swept through many sections of the east and south yesterday, swirling into business sections, halting some war work, clogging transportation and causing many households to flee.

Damage and rising hazards were reported to extend from Connecticut to the Mississippi on the west and Georgia, Alabama and Arkansas on the south.

Many Homeless
William Carl Hunt, manager of the eastern area of the American Red Cross, estimated that 15,000 persons were homeless because of floods in Pennsylvania, West Virginia, Ohio, Kentucky, Tennessee and Alabama. There were 5,000 homeless in the Pittsburgh area alone, he said, calling this the worst December flood on record.

The Red Cross chapter in Wellsburg, O., reported that it was taking money out of flood-threatened savings banks, while in Marietta, O., the rationing board was aiding the chapter by supplying emergency coffee.

Red Cross Active
The Red Cross has sent 14 national workers into the flooded areas, it said, to aid local chapters feed and clothe refugees.

Power plants and communications were shut off in the interior of Connecticut, while swollen streams caused general flood warnings to be flashed in upstate New York near Albany and Rochester.

The Rio River climbed dangerously near flood stage last night in the Louisville, Ky., area and the Mississippi reached its highest December level in history at St. Louis. Rivers in Georgia kept rising steadily while the Arkansas and Ouachita Rivers in Arkansas reached seriously high crests.

The bodies of two Negroes who drowned while attempting to drive cattle to safety were found in flood waters near Centerville, Ala., yesterday, bringing the flood toll in

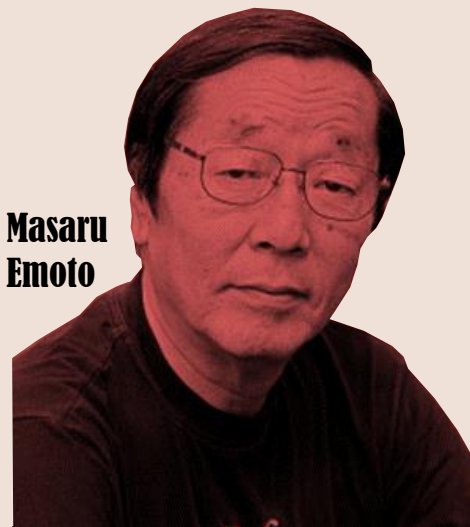
